
From Famine to Feasting

PREPARE YOUR HEART & MIND

Begin this time in prayer, confessing any sins you can recall, thanking the Lord for the gift of His Word, and asking for His Spirit to guide you in your time.

GROW IN THE WORD

With God's blessing, Jacob and his family left the promised land for Egypt to escape the famine and
reunite with Joseph. The author listed all of Jacob's descendants who went with him, which
included his sons and their families. The total number who went to Egypt was 70 (46:1-27).

•	What stands out to you about the way Jacob left the promised land to escape the famine?
	Compare his flight to Egypt with Abraham's in Genesis 12:10-13.





Jacob tearfully reunited with his son Joseph after many years apart. Joseph presented his family as shepherds to Pharaoh and asked if they could settle in the land of Goshen. Pharoah met the family and granted Joseph's request. Jacob blessed Pharoah, and the Israelites thrived in Egypt (46:28-47:12).

• What thoughts or feelings arise as you read about Jacob and Joseph's reunion?

• What did Joseph emphasize when he prepared his family to speak before Pharoah? In other words, what might he have been afraid they might do before Pharaoh? See the end of verse 34 and consider their family history.

GROW IN THE WORD

• What lessons can you learn about a family's cycle of sin, and Joseph's choice to deal honestly with Pharaoh? For further study, see Genesis 12:10-20; 20:1-18; 26:1-11; 27:1-29; 37:12-36.

The famine continued, and Egyptians and Canaanites alike ran out of money for grain. Joseph created a system to allow those in need to exchange livestock and servitude for provision and protection. Pharoah prospered and the people were saved. Nearing death, Jacob asked Joseph to bury him back in the promised land (47:13-31).

- In what ways can you learn from Joseph's example of finding solutions to problems affecting his community and working for their good?
- Why do you think it was important to Jacob to be buried in Canaan with his fathers?
- What's your biggest takeaway from these chapters?
